Directions to June 6th Meeting

From Philadelphia/NJ via I-95 south, or from south Jersey via Commodore Barry/I-95 north: Take I-95 to I-476 ("Blue Route") north. Take Exit 5 for Route 1 South (going west to Lima). Follow Rt 1 about 4 miles; just after the highway ends, exit right for Route 352 North. Follow Rt 352 (Middletown Rd) for about 3 miles, then turn left on Sycamore Mills Rd (Locust Crest Tavern on left). Holly Lane is a cul-de-sac about 0.7 miles on the right. About 20–25 minutes from I-95.

From PA Turnpike or points NE: Take turnpike or other routes to I-476 ("Blue Route") south. Take Exit 5 for Route 1 South (going west to Lima). Follow directions from Rt 1 above.

From Wilmington/points S and W via Rt 202 N/Rt 1: Take Rt 202 North (from I-95 in Wilmington, as needed) to Route 1 North, about 7.4 miles from I-95. Turn right on Rt 1. Follow Rt 1 about 6.5 miles to Route 452 North; turn left. Turn left from Rt 452 to Rt 352 in less than 1/2 mile. Follow Rt 352 about 2 miles as above. About 30 minutes from I-95.

From West Chester/points N and W via Rt 202 S: Take Route 202/322 South to Route 3 East at West Chester. Stay on Rt 3 (West Chester Pike) about 4.5 miles. Just past the intersection for Dutton Mill Rd (north), turn right on Dutton Mill Rd (south), which becomes Valley Rd when it crosses Rt 926. Take Dutton Mill/Valley Rd about 2.5 miles to Sycamore Mills Rd; turn left. Holly Lane is a cul-de-sac about 0.2 miles on the left. About 15 minutes from West Chester.

DVHS to Host Judges' Clinic I

On **Saturday**, **July 18**, the Delaware Valley Hosta Society offers you the opportunity to jump on the pathway toward major hosta nerd-dom: becoming an AHS-accredited show judge! Seriously, this is a big deal, and also seriously, anyone can do it! You don't need to be a hosta guru already, able to rattle off the names of hundreds of hostas a hundred paces away. If you can use a ruler, can see spots on a leaf (I use glasses), and count to 15 (veins), you're already on your way. We just want people who are interested in hostas, and interested in learning more.

The AHS website (www.americanhostasociety.org) has this to say:

Persons who are considering becoming a Hosta Show Judge should:

- Have a good knowledge of existing hosta species and cultivars, and a general knowledge of hybridizing trends.
- · Have a long-term commitment to serve as a show judge.
- Be eager to expand their knowledge. *Knowledge and desire to learn* is essential.

It goes on to say a whole lot more, but they'll cover that in the clinic. And the instructors will try to keep it interesting. This is the first level course, but it is not merely an introduction. At the completion of the class, you will be able to file your status as a Provisional Judge for the AHS. (More advanced judges should note that this clinic also serves as one of your refresher courses, required every four years.)

Clinic I outlines the contents of the Judges' Handbook, the structure and planning of a Hosta Show, and then the fun part: judging hosta leaves for the Horticulture (cut leaf) division of a Hosta Show. Those of you who have prepared leaves for shows in the past can learn a lot—about how to select, and prepare, winning leaves! (Clinics II and III, for advancing on your path to Senior and Master Judge, cover the container plant categories and special divisions.)

DVHS Meeting, June 6, 2015

Lunch, Garden Tour, and Auction Holly Lane Gardens, Conny and Jim Parsons, Glen Mills, Pennsylvania

Set on a 2.5-acre wedge-shaped lot on the Holly Lane cul-de-sac, our garden surrounds a central sweep of lawn, bordered by trees and planted with sunny and shady island beds and long shady borders on all sides. Over the last fifteen years, we have planted over a hundred small trees, shrubs and conifers that have either flowers, interesting bark, or colorful foliage. With wetlands on one side of the property and black walnut trees on the other side, gardening has been an ongoing challenge for both Jim and me. We like to have something blooming from early spring to late fall so we planted many dogwoods (Cornus), redbuds (Cercis), viburnums, roses and hydrangea. Japanese maples add both colorful foliage and textures. A deer fence keeps the deer at bay.

Jim doubled the size of the original deck, and built a pergola on the back of the house. Trough plantings, both for sun and shade, brighten this area. Close to the deck is a two-tiered pond, designed to maintain a natural balance using water hyacinths in the upper tier to filter the water for the larger, lower tier. I recently added a new garden to the right of the pond where a large selection of small and miniature hostas, including the mice ('Blue Mouse Ears' family), found a home. A gate opens to the side yard, which extends

to three large dawn-redwoods (Metasequoia). This is where we installed a fenced holding area, where there are still hostas for Barnes and other public gardens.

About two years ago we did something a little crazy: we added a swimming pool. The biggest challenge was incorporating it and the required fence into an existing landscape. We attempted to do this by including a mature bed on one side and adding a border around the outside of the fence where we planted low-growing conifers and flowering shrubs. Grass paths, a rock garden, and pebble path surround the pool instead of cement or pavers. Holly, our yellow Lab, and all our grandkids love the addition.

I almost forgot to mention a collection of about 600 hosta cultivars and many shade-loving plants and flowers. You will have to ask Jim about all the stones and stone paths throughout the garden; there's not enough room for his descriptions in this article! As we have gotten older, more benches and chairs have been added along with a Gator, an addition to our John Deere fleet. We hope you will take the time to walk back to the gazebo and sit on the rockers, where you can enjoy the feel of the smaller private garden, almost hidden from the house.


Over the winter we were informed by the American Hosta Society (AHS) that our case file for the National Hosta Display Garden at the Barnes Arboretum was approved! This is the only National Hosta Display Garden within 500 miles of Philadelphia, and it is one of the few located in an urban setting (being only blocks from the city limit of a major metropolitan area).

As this three-phase project comes to fruition, let's reflect on the participation of many who helped make this garden possible. Financial contributions by DVHS and AHS Region One were essential for the purchase of most of the plants for this garden, which includes over 135 hosta cultivars, several new shrubs, and new companion perennials. Members also donated hostas, as well as their time to grow them on in their nursery beds and then to plant them in the garden at Barnes.

The contributions of time and talent made by our own long-time member and past president, Conny Parsons, and her husband Jim, were significant. From well-thought garden design, to sourcing and procuring the plants, tending those that were still quite small, potting and delivering plants to the Barnes on work days, and directing volunteers in planting technique, Conny was the driving force in the development of this garden.

Barnes Arboretum director Jacob Thomas demonstrated foresight and determination in working with the DVHS to develop this garden, which took 3 years to complete. Also from Barnes were staff members Kristen and Bill, who led efforts in maintenance and labeling of the plants in this garden. Barnes and DVHS volunteers joined forces on several occasions to prepare the garden beds, plant the hostas, and to weed and edge the beds.

DVHS Financial Report for 2015

Below are the income and expense totals for the year (grouped into categories; figures rounded to nearest dollar). Last year included a Hosta Show, which boosts our meeting costs and adds to miscellaneous costs (ribbons, *etc.*). There was also additional expense and income from sale of books (*Hosta Handbook*) last year. We did not spend as much on the display gardens as planned (due to donations and well-tended plants previously purchased). For reference, income and expenses in 2013 were well-matched at about \$5,500.
